# **JULY BOARD BRIEFS**

What a summer so far for us. Weather has been great and we are deep into getting community projects done or underway.

Food/Beverage: We had a great community meeting with CulinArt on 6/5. Many residents came to the Ballroom to meet the new vendor and enjoy some tasty snacks, always a great way to say to say hi. CulinArt is on site now and working to get all areas of our food/beverage service back up and running starting with a 7/4 BBQ. We will hold it rain or shine using the Clubhouse Ballroom as a backup location to the knoll if the rains come. Also, do note that some areas of the food/beverage service may not be up and running as soon as July 1st but Culinart plans to offer other services such as food trucks to carry us along while they get all organized in the Clubhouse as well as Marsh Mansion. A new firm and a new day, so get ready for great food and great customer service.

**Golf Course and Pro Shop:** The Board did receive the report from our Golf consultant firm GGA. Based on their report we are creating a Request for Proposal (RFP) that will go out to approximately 12 golf management firms. We hope to hear back from a number of them by 8/1/24 with their proposals. In the meantime, UTP is working with us on a 6 month contract that will take care of the regrassing period as well as making sure the course and pro shop are maintained until a new vendor is selected. When the course is closed our pro shop staff has made arrangements for golfers to play at other area clubs. For information contact the pro shop for exact details.

PWCSA and when are they done in Heritage

**Hunt:** The Board, Management and Grounds Committee Reps get updates via Zoom from PWCSA and their subcontractor Archer Western. At this time, they feel that work will done by early fall. There will be road work done and more will be done by the HOA with reimbursement from PWCSA which is based on the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that we have with them. Our General Manager Michael Yelton is in daily contact with PWCSA/Archer Western and we are following up on a punch list of items that need to be done as these projects get completed. We thank the Grounds Committee for all their backup work on the many issues that arose from these construction projects.

Candidates for 2025 / Board and Committees: YES YOUR COMMUNITY NEEDS YOU!!! Our Board and our Committees will have open seats that we need candidates to fill. This edition of the Horn has articles from the Board and the Committees on what their responsibilities to the Association are. We will also have a Meet the Board, Meet the Committees session on Friday August 30 at 10 am in the Ballroom. We will ask for questions ahead of time that interested residents want answered of the Board or any Committee. We will make sure they are answered at the meeting as well as any other questions that come up. Also, because of resident comments, we have revised Administrative Resolution #8 Voting and Candidate Eligibility. We will link the revisions to upcoming E-Comms, but they will also be on the HOA page of the Website under Documents. Among them are that 3 weeks before the end of Declaration of Candidacy who is running will be announced each week so everyone is aware of all candidates. Do make sure to review the entire Resolution and DO **CONSIDER RUNNING!!** 

The Following resolutions were approved at the 5/23/24 Board General Meeting. Due to Horn publishing dates they appear here a month late. For a quicker review please check the website under Board of Directors as the minutes are posted there within 2 weeks of the meetings:

• Approved to allow HH concerts to market events outside of HH until the reservations reach 275 at which time they will be terminated and the remainder of the reservations held for HH residents.

• Approved CAMP to do an annual write off to any account, including Club and Assessment accounts that maintain a delinquent account of \$10.00 or less.

• Approved additional Jonas/Encore expenses of \$1100 for software to support the new POS system.

• Approved a new 3 year cleaning and porterage contract to CIA Cleaning services to start 7/01/24

• Approved revision to Ethics and Behavior Policy which added a code of civility.

• Approved revisions to Administrative Resolution #15 - Association Record retention.

• Approved revisions to Administrative Resolution #23 - Standard Operating Procedures.

## **BOARD OF DIRECTORS**

*Live - Play- Thrive* is the new motto for Heritage Hunt that describes the spirit of this active-adult community. Service on the BOD will provide the opportunity for you continue to *live* in a beautiful neighborhood, *play* all the amenities, and *thrive* by volunteering your time for a good cause.

Yes, being a Board member requires commitment, but it also provides a sense of satisfaction in knowing that you helped to ensure that Heritage Hunt continues to live, play and thrive as the premier Active Adult Community in Northern Virginia.

Your community needs you to volunteer to serve on our Board of Directors if you are willing to: • Set the policies, standards, procedures, programs and budgets for the Association in accordance with the governing documents.

• Balance the needs and obligations of the Community, as a whole, with those of individual owners.

• Act within Board authority, to exercise due care, and to act in good faith and with ordinary care in the best interests of the Association.

• Commit to attend two (2) regularly scheduled Board meetings each month and other meetings during the month called for a specific purpose such as appeal hearings, budget meetings or Executive Sessions; and

• Commit to serving as Liaison to the Standing Committees and attend their respective Committee meetings.

• Board members rely on our Managing Agent for the daily operation of the Association and on our Standing Committees for advice and recommendations.

# ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW COMMITTEE (ARC)

The ARC has seven elected members. We meet the second and fourth Wednesday of each month in the Mountain View Room, except in November and December when meetings occur on the second Tuesday of those months.

We are responsible for approving Design Review Applications submitted by homeowners to change the appearance of their house or lot. The Design Guidelines guide us in making our decisions. The committee Chair reviews the application to be sure all necessary information has been provided and that the project meets the guidelines. The Chair then assigns between one and three applications to each committee member.

The member reaches out to the homeowner to get any additional information needed to better describe the project and usually visits the home. During committee meetings, a committee member tells the project's "story" to the committee using the information from the application, discussions with the homeowner, and any images they may have taken during the home visit. We then vote on approval of the application. The committee member then notifies the applicant of the committee's decision.

We also modify the Design Guidelines on a periodic basis.

We do NOT inspect properties for violations which is the role of the Covenants Administrator.

Serving on the ARC is a rewarding experience. We work with homeowners to help them get their projects approved. Our first-time approval rate is over 98% (which is rare in this area). Helping residents get their projects approved is rewarding and fun.

No special background or skill set is required to serve on the ARC. We upload photos and other materials to our shared cloud-based committee folder to make them available to our fellow committee members. We email to communicate with the committee and HOA management staff.

The Guidelines are clearly written for easy understanding.

## **BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE**

The Budget and Finance Committee provides financial oversight of the HH Homeowners Association (HOA) and advises the Board of Directors on financial matters. A financially strong HOA ensures that our amenities, services and infrastructure are maintained at a level that keeps us a desirable community. It also ensures that dues remain reasonable and only increase when necessary. Our superb set of amenities and services benefit the lives of every homeowner in the community. You don't have to be an accountant but some familiarity with finance and/or budget is helpful. The committee is composed of seven members, and generally meets on the fourth Wednesday of every month. Some of the responsibilities associated with this committee are the following:

Oversee preparation of the annual integrated operations and reserve budget.

Review monthly reports prepared by the Managing Agent and Club Services Vendors.

Review and analyze adherence to current budget and recommend remedial actions as necessary.

Review the Annual Audit and make appropriate recommendations to the Board of Directors.

Ensure adherence to HOA Contracting Policies and Procedures.

Assign liaisons to the HOA committees and attend their meetings.

Review resolutions from HOA committees and make recommendations to the Board of Directors whether to approve the spending or not.

Monitor reserve studies and related accounts.

## **COMMUNITY RELATIONS COMMITTEE**

The Community Relations Committee's primary responsibility is to inform the Board of Directors and, most importantly, the community about issues, concerns, and activities of interest to Heritage Hunt residents. Our members monitor public and private sector developments that may impact Heritage Hunt; arrange Town Halls and community briefings.

• Work closely with our managing agent, and HOA committees to provide the Board with policy recommendations designed to improve the communication efforts of the HOA, and supporting our Lifestyle Director with excursion planning.

• Conduct successful Blood Drives, 4 so far this year. Heritage Hunt has hosted over 50 blood drives since late 2000's, donated over 1588 units of usable blood and recruited 1773 donors. These blood drives have met and often exceeded Red Cross blood drive goals which have increased from 25 in June 2017 to an average of 32 per drive.

• CRC continues to grow and offer more and more activities to keep our community informed and entertained. CRC is made up of several programs and we continue to sponsor a number of sub-committees, task force groups, and special events to provide a full calendar of fun, exciting and informative programs and events each month.

• Resident Forum - This program features Heritage Hunt residents, and others when possible, to share their experiences and/or areas of expertise with our residents. Topics have included Artificial Intelligence, Helicopters, and The Nuremberg Trials.

• Health Series - This program offers a variety of health related topics each month. This year topics included Strokes, Adult Mental Health, and Orthopedics.

#### COMMUNITY RELATIONS COMMITTEE (CONTINUED)

• Host Social Activities events, in order to bring residents together. These include Newcomer Dinners, Dances, Model Train Open Houses, Memorial Day and Vetarans Day events, the Holiday Show and much much more.

• CRC's Welcome New Residents Program offers many opportunities for newcomers to meet other residents and to learn more about Heritage Hunt as they settle into our community. Our goal is to welcome and encourage newcomers to find their niche in Heritage Hunt. Newcomers are also invited to brunches, dinners, and potlucks throughout their first 6 months of living in HH.

• Communicate with area elementary schools during the year to offer the help of our volunteers. ESVPP promotes residents working together to help area school children have better lives.

• Match up those who have handicapped equipment to loan or donate with those residents who have temporary or permanent need of wheelchairs and other handicapped equipment

• Sponsor Cinema Sisters Free Movie Nights each month. The highly anticipated monthly Free Movie Night event draws from 76 to 172 residents for each show.

• Everyone is welcome to attend our meetings, held on the first Monday of every month at 1:00 PM in the Mt. View Room. Please visit and consider running for any vacancies in December.

#### EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS COMMITTEE (EPC)

**EPC Mission:** We provide capabilities to respond to and prepare for emergencies or disasters that affect the safety and welfare of the HH Community and promote self-reliance of residents through effective communications, training, and education.

**Structure:** The Emergency Preparedness Task Force (EPTF) was formed in 2002. It studied the threats to and vulnerabilities of our area and provided readiness information to the Heritage Hunt community. The EPTF evolved into HH Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC) in 2014. The committee has seven elected members and three appointed Zone Directors. The EPC meets at 9:30AM on the first Wednesday of the month in the Garden Room in March Mansion. Currently we have one open positions on the Board and need a Northeast Zone Director.

**Emergency Volunteers:** Who We Are & What We Do: We are volunteers and your neighbors, with the desire to assist HH residents in the event of a disaster. We are educators. We train HH residents in CPR and AED procedures. We arrange for First Aid and Stop-the-Bleeding courses. Residents can register for training at: cprhhepc@gmail.com

We encourage HH residents through various media to learn self-sufficiency and to prepare for and respond to disasters. This includes installing Knox Boxes allowing quick access by First Responders and having a File of Life on your refrigerator for conveying critical medical information to them.

#### **Emergency Volunteer Activities:**

Participating in our annual training exercise, which practices assisting emergency response and recovery operations using communication equipment and the emergency response structure.
Training in CPR and AEDs. Certified classes are offered annually as well as the uncertified classes offered by the Committee quarterly.

• Taking a first aid class when offered.

• Learning to use Family Radio Service

(FRS – walkie-talkie) radios and radio procedures. Classes are held to learn and to update skills annually.

• Assisting when the HH Emergency

Coordination System is activated.

- Passing information from authoritative sources to neighbors.
- Acquiring and maintaining a 3-day or more supply of food, water and supplies for sheltering in place and encouraging residents to do so.
- Assisting the EPC in its various projects.
- Researching and reporting emergency preparedness and response best practices and state of the art equipment.
- Participating in regular EV meetings and training events.

• Assisting in the fire hydrant stake installation and retrieval.

EVs can participate in as many or as few activities above as they are comfortable with and are available. If you would like to join us in our mission, there is an application form at the Clubhouse Front Desk, entitled "HOW CAN YOU HELP IN CASE OF EMERGENCY?" ### FACILITIES COMMITTEE

The Facilities Committee has the primary responsibility to advise the Board of Directors in a reasonable and productive manner, on issues affecting the use and enjoyment of HOA commonly owned facilities by the membership.

What that means is that we are helping to keep the buildings and the facilities in Heritage Hunt in top condition! This includes the Clubhouse, Fitness Center, indoor and outdoor pools, tennis, pickleball and bocce courts, Marsh Mansion, the Golf Maintenance building, comfort stations on the golf course, and the gazebo on Paddock Pond! We are a busy committee, working hard to keep everything from equipment storage buildings for the golf course to the Clubhouse itself looking bright and beautiful! We want you to feel proud that you live here!

The Committee collaborates closely with the Board of Directors, the other committees, and CAMP's Facilities manager to make sure things are running smoothly. We work especially closely with Food and Beverage as our responsibilities in the Clubhouse overlap in many ways. Facilities members also act as liaisons to the other committees.

We work with CAMP in planning renovation projects which are recommended each year as part of the Reserve Study. There are several on the books for 2025, including remodeling the Library and Mountain View Room. The lower-level bathrooms will be finished in early 25 as well. This is the fun part, but these things take time! Believe it or not, we are still very involved in the remodel of the Clubhouse following the major flood at Christmas time of 2022!

Though we do currently have committee members who were contractors, grant writers, and engineers

in real life, there is always room for residents who are organized, observant people with no experience in this area at all! If you are interested in being involved in HH in a productive, creative way, the Facilities Committee may be just what you need!

## FOOD & BEVERAGE COMMITTEE

Heritage Hunt has many wonderful amenities for our residents to enjoy. One of the most important amenities is the food and beverage amenity, which falls under the purview of the Food & Beverage Committee.

The primary goal of the F&B Committee is to support and improve the "active lifestyle" of our residents in a financially responsible manner. The committee's responsibilities include collaborating with the club services contractor and advising the Board of Directors on any issues relating to the food and beverage amenities, as we ensure that they take place in a welcoming environment and consistently provide a variety of offerings at competitive prices with superior service. Residents should feel a sense of belonging when they enter any F&B venue at Heritage Hunt - this is their club.

The Food & Beverage Committee oversees the operation, maintenance, improvements, and enhancements for many HOA-owned facilities including the ROBG, Clubhouse Ballroom, and the kitchens in the Clubhouse and Marsh Mansion. The committee works hard to support the Heritage Hunt HOA business plan with input from other appropriate committees. We not only provide a variety of offerings in the restaurant and bar, but host other resident events, including picnics at the Marsh Mansion, holiday dinners, such as Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day, and Thanksgiving, as well as Breakfast with Santa, Kids' Day in August, and many other social events (that include food and beverages).

The Food & Beverage Committee is a dynamic group of hard-working volunteers. Please consider joining our committee. Election for new positions will be held in December.

## **GOLF COMMITTEE**

Are you an avid golfer? Do you play several times a week? Consider giving back to the community by serving on the Golf Committee. The Golf Committee meets once a month on the second Wednesday at 3:00 pm. The primary responsibility of the Golf Committee is to advise the Board of Directors on issues related to operations and maintenance of the Heritage Hunt golf course. ## **GROUNDS COMMITTEE**

The Grounds Committee is responsible for maintenance, repair and improvement of our neighborhood's common areas. Some of our projects include:

- Working with our landscape contractor to keep our community award-winning!
- Tree trimming, removal and replacement
- Road, sidewalk and walking path maintenance and repair
- Parking, traffic management and safety issues
- Ponds, irrigation, drainage and erosion control
- Maintaining retaining walls and fences
- Gatehouse maintenance and security systems
- Snow and trash removal operations

#### INVESTING & CASH MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The Investing and Cash Management Committee(I&CMC) is seeking property owner volunteers to become members.

The Committee responsibilities include investing, monitoring, and reinvesting funds to meet the goals of maximizing return while assuring that funds are available when needed. We are responsible for the Association's investing activities. This includes investments that support the Repair and Replacement Fund, Roads Infrastructure Fund, Major Projects Fund, and other reserve funds as established by the Board of Directors. Investment opportunities are governed by Virginia State regulations.

Additionally, we monitor cash balances for compliance with insurance limits such as those promulgated by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). We coordinate closely with the Budget and Finance Committee to identify future reserve spending requirements.

Currently, the Heritage Hunt investment portfolio has a market value of approximately \$8.8M.

There are five voting members on the Investing and Cash Management Committee. Three are property owners elected during the annual elections. The Chairperson is the Treasurer of the Board of Directors. The fifth member is appointed from the Budget and Finance Committee. Meetings are held monthly on either the 2nd or 3rd Thursday. Generally, meetings are held in the Marsh Mansion Conference Room beginning at 3:30PM.

There will be one opening on the Investing and Cash Management Committee to be filled during our Fall 2024 elections. If you have a background or an interest in investing, please consider your candidacy. The newly elected member will serve a three year term.

Please consider offering your talents and experience to our Community.

#### LIGHT, SOUND AND TELEVISION COMMITTEE (LSTV)

LSTV provides the Heritage Hunt community with light, sound, video/slide presentations and

television broadcast capabilities for our Board of Directors and HH HOA Committee monthly meetings, Town Hall meetings, the HOA Annual Meeting as well as numerous clubs/groups and special events such as HH Little Theater, Holiday Show, HH Concerts. LSTV is a group of almost 20 non-elected volunteers who routinely support 20-40 events each month for our community. We believe this capability is unrivaled in other 55+ communities in northern Virginia.



## **RESIDENT FORUM** SLAVERY STILL EXISTS TODAY

Wednesday, July 17th. 2:00pm Clubhouse Ballroom



More people are enslaved today than at any other time in history. We prevent and disrupt modern day slavery while restoring lives. Become a modern-day abolitionist. Be a defender of freedom knowing you are making a difference in your community by preventing and disrupting modern-day slavery while restoring lives.

**RESET180** is a local, Christian non-profit organization that partners with community members to prevent and disrupt modern-day slavery while restoring survivors. Human trafficking is the force, fraud, or coercion of an individual for commercial sex or local labor in exchange for something of value (money, clothing, food, etc.). If a person under the age of 18 is providing commercial sex, they are automatically considered a victim of sex trafficking.

Human/sex trafficking of children is a \$100-million industry in the DC Metropolitan Area. There are 14 verified locations where sex trafficking happens just 11 miles from here. Additionally, there are approximately 16,000 people being sold online within a 50-mile radius of the Reset180 office, which encompasses Prince William County.

**RESET180's** mission is to prevent human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation, disrupt the related networks, and restore those impacted through trauma-informed case management that provides access to vital services that survivors need to stabilize and eventually live independently.

The presenters for this event are both members of the Reset180 Board: Barbara Jean Wilson, survivor leader, author, speaker and Chelsey Trevino, Finance Director. You won't want to miss this opportunity to listen to them!



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# EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS COMMITTEE

# PRINCE WILLIAM COUNTY - HERE TO HELP US


The Giving Circle of Heritage Hunt invited the Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC) to join them on a visit to the Prince William Sheriff's Office for a demonstration of Project Lifesaver and Senior Safe. They were greeted by Sheriff Hill and Major Fearnley who thanked The Giving Circle and HH Women's Organization for their support since 2015. Project Lifesaver relies on donations and does not receive taxpayer funds. The EPC thanks The Giving Circle and the HH Women's Organization, which through their generosity helps support these free programs for use by all county residents.



Our residents, including Judy Flynn (Giving Circle) and Neil Kelley (EPC) learned about the equipment used from Master Deputy Truesdale. Project Lifesaver is a national program that

protects wandering participants. Project Lifesaver's uses state-of-the-art technology to assist those who care for victims of Alzheimer's and other developmental disabilities that become lost. This includes the elderly who are afflicted and tend to wander from their homes. Project Lifesaver places personalized radio transmitters on identified persons with developmental disabilities such as Alzheimer's. These personalized wristband transmitters assist caregivers and local emergency agencies in locating those who cannot help themselves. When notified the local Project Lifesaver agency responds with a search and rescue team to the wanderer's area and starts searching with the mobile locator tracking system.

The wristband is much more than a passive ID bracelet. The one-ounce battery-operated transmitter emits an automatic tracking signal every second. The signal is tracked on the ground or as demonstrated by Master Deputy Bakalov, using a drone. The wristband has a unique radio frequency so the search team can locate and identify the person who has wandered away from



home or care facility. Search times have been reduced from hours and days to minutes.

Another program, the Senior Safe program, is a free-of-charge

program designed using a Personal Emergency Response System (PERS) to assist in protecting seniors while they remain in their homes. The system allows users to connect with the Sheriff's Office for help by pressing a help button that is worn as a necklace, pendant, or wristband. Seniors can access this help anytime, 24 hours a day. The Senior Safe program can help seniors remain independent and possibly avoid a retirement home by sending help fast in the event of an emergency, such as a medical, fall, or even an intruder situation.

Deputies will install the Help Dialer 700 to the client's existing home landline phone jack and program 3 emergency contact phone numbers into equipment with the last phone number being the Sheriff's Office number. Deputies will also record emergency messages onto equipment stating the client's name, and address and that the client has an emergency. When the client activates their panic buttons the Help Dialer 700 calls the 3 phone numbers and plays your personalized emergency message. If a courthouse deputy or their control receives the call, the receiver simply presses any button on their phone and opens the full 2-way communication through the built-in speakerphone from 100 feet away. The receiver of the call will record all emergency information and then contact 911.

## FOOD & BEVERAGE COMMITTEE

Guy Fieri, American restaurateur and television presenter, says "Food is not just eating energy. It's an experience." For the nearly 300 residents in the Ballroom at the June 5th Town Hall with CulinArt Group there was a lot of energy, CulinArt cookies and an interactive, information filled experience!

The CulinArt team, led by Peter Witkowski, President, and Pete Rocco, Regional Director of Operations, presented their vision as our food and beverage provider, which will transition to their management as of July 1. They come to Heritage Hunt with adult community and country club experience. I spoke to the team about their excitement in winning Heritage Hunt's business and their plans for the Red Oak Bar and Grill (ROBG) and more.



It's clear from both their presentation and in speaking with them they are very happy to be here. They describe making multiple drives through our community last April and how impressed they were with the attractiveness of Heritage Hunt, our clubhouse and the outdoor activity areas. They became convinced they could enhance and expand our services, not just at the ROBG, but Marsh Mansion, the pool, in the Clubhouse and with an expanded mobile market cart that would service not just the golf course but other activity locations.

They are a "Food First" company aiming to improve the quality of our experience "inside the gates." Chef Angie Peccini, who leads culinary development, describes menus that are innovative, with food prepared with fresh, locally sourced ingredients in a scratch kitchen. Stephanie Dorfman, their Director of Nutrition and Wellness, shares their Eat Well philosophy, which focuses on dietary requirements, allergens, sustainability and nutrition. The "All American" menu will draw from regional specialties and we should expect high quality fish, steak and great sandwiches. Peter joked, "If it's a hot dog you crave after golf, we plan to serve up the best hot dog possible!"

So, what should we expect for July? They did warn that this is an incredibly fast vendor transition and they are committed to aggressive timelines. Pete Rocco defines an approach focusing on bringing the kitchen and service areas up to CulinArt standards. In the first weeks of July they will refresh the kitchen, ramp up relationships with local vendors and train existing and new staff.



Look to kick things off with our July 4th barbeque and while the menu wasn't finalized when I spoke with them, expect them to show up with "Smoky Roads", where it's highly likely Peter, will man the smoker!

They are also working out plans to introduce food truck events in the



community, as they work behind the scenes readying the restaurant for opening. A soft opening for the ROBG, which gives them a chance to refine their services and work out any

operational kinks, is planned for mid-July.

Watch for announcements for an August grand opening, where they plan a party with food, fun and prizes! The CulinArt team has lots more plans to encourage resident engagement, including celebrity chef series, wine dinners and tasting events.

Peter does have one thing to ask of Heritage Hunt residents. "Give us a chance to make a good impression, and when we do, tell your friends. Or better yet, bring a friend who hasn't been to the restaurant in a while with you!"

Habitat for Humanity - Prince William County (HH-PWC) serves low-income families by engaging residents and other community partners to revive neighborhoods and make them safe, inviting places to live. Since their founding in February 1994, HH-PWC has completed 27 new home builds and acquired and renovated 17 homes for families in PW County, Manassas City, and Manassas Park.

Their Neighborhood Revitalization Initiative delivers a wide array of housing solutions such as making minor exterior repairs; providing critical home repairs that alleviate critical health, life, and safety issues or housing code violations; rehabbing vacant and foreclosed homes or building new homes to provide home ownership opportunities for low-income families; and improving the energy efficiency of homes through weatherization.

At a meeting on April 24, open to the entire HH community, Markus Crewe, Executive Director,



HH-PWC, spoke about a "shelter" grant from The Giving Circle and how that grant funded a project that allowed a disabled veteran to stay in his home. With this monetary support and the help of HH-PWC volunteers, the

project included a clean-up of the property and a fence repair that allowed this thankful veteran to meet property code requirements and remain in his home.



Habitat works together with families, local communities, volunteers and partners so that more people can live in affordable and safe homes. Their advocacy efforts focus on policy reform to remove systemic barriers preventing low income and historically underserved families from accessing adequate, affordable shelter.



The Giving Circle and its almost 200 members are proud to support HH-PWC & other organizations to help those less fortunate in our greater area.

In 2023, The Giving Circle awarded \$91,700 to 17 local charities. Every dollar donated by members goes directly into a grant to help those in need in the categories of - food, clothing, shelter, literacy, mental health, and physical health. In October 2024, when grants are again awarded, we may be able to do even more.

# **GOLF COMMITTEE NEWS**

#### **GOLF ETIQUETTE 101 PART I**

#### **Inter-Group Golf Etiquette**

Depending on the seriousness of you and your friends' golf game that day, you may or may not adopt some of the more formal golf etiquette practices. However, it's important to establish expectations before the round to make sure everyone is on the same page. Maybe you agree to 1 mulligan per round and to improving your lie within one scorecard length. Whatever your groups' unique rules are, make them clear and make sure everyone understands before you begin.

There are several golf etiquette practices that are universal:

• Lowest score on the previous hole tees off first.

• Player furthest from the hole goes first. Including on the green.

• Mark your ball when on the green while others are putting.

• Do not walk in-between a player's, or your own, ball and the hole on the green.

• Be quiet while others are hitting their shots.

It's customary to adhere to these universal golf etiquette rules unless you've asked your playing partners for an exception. You might be ready to hit your shot before the person closest to the hole, or maybe you're ready to tee off and the player who birdied the previous hole isn't. In these instances, you would offer to go first to keep pace of play moving.

#### **Intra-Group Golf Etiquette**

While playing a round of golf, you also have a responsibility to ensure other golfers on the course that day have the opportunity to enjoy their round too. Beginning with replacing or filing your divots in the fairway, repairing ball marks on the green, yelling "FORE!" when you hit an errant shot towards other golfers, and allowing faster players/ groups to play through.

It's extremely rude to not let a group play through that is waiting on your group. The one exception is if you're also waiting because of the group in front of you. If this is the case, you should make this known to the group behind you. Your ability to play golf doesn't have to dictate your pace of play. If you're new to the game, set a stroke limit of 3 over par for each hole. Once you get to triple bogey, pick up your ball and place it on the green. Finish the hole from there. Be on the lookout for Golf Etiquette 101 Part II, where we discuss more golf etiquette practices regarding pace of play. We can all play a role in making golf more accessible and fun for everyone who wants to play. Have fun!



LSTV is made up of smart, dedicated people and a good deal of technology and equipment. A lot of our equipment is getting old and past its useful life. (Like me.) We are in the process of getting bids from tech/support companies for improvements that are budgeted for 2025/2026.

We currently have (3) rooms with built in equipment:

- Mountain View Room
- Great Oak Ballroom

• AV Control Room downstairs – (This is our connecting point for the other rooms and the transmission point for our two Comcast Local channels. This is where we record events and re-broadcast at other times.)

For all other locations, AV equipment is rolled in on a cart. This cart supports meetings and groups in rooms such as:

- Blue Ridge Room
- Marsh Mansion Rooms
- Board Room
- Craft Room

Part of our current plan is to upgrade equipment that requires changing up or out. We started creating the current systems in 2015.

• Our goal is to enhance our community's experience when attending events.

• Enhance the Heritage Hunt experience to make people 55 or better want to come and live.

• Allow a larger number of meeting rooms with built in AV equipment to allow more committee and group meetings as well as attract potential revenue meetings.

As the number of AV supported events increases, as well as the AV sophistication applied to these events, there is only so much LSTV can do.

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


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## PHOTOGRAPHY CLUB

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

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
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## HH CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN WINE SOCIETY

June's wine adventure took us to South America where our presenter, Phil Pickney of Kysela Peres et Fils in Winchester introduced us to seven delightful wines.

From Argentina we tasted a light bright sparkling wine from the Viejo Isaias Don Iaisais Vineyard. This wine is half chardonnay and half chenin blanc and is produced from grapes that grow in the highlands of the Mendoza River. We also enjoyed a 2022 Chardonnay from the Chakana Winery. Chakana is the Incan name for the Southern Cross constellation which is featured on the winery's labels. Its rotation in the sky throughout the year made it an effective agricultural calendar for the ancient Andean people.

Moving to Chile we tasted two wines from Vina Siegel, a 2022 Viognier and 2022 Carmenere. Viña Siegel was founded in 1980 and initially, only sold bulk wines to the biggest Chilean wineries, like Concha y Toro, San Pedro and Santa Rita. In 1997, they entered the bottled wines business and now has a capacity of over 3 million gallons.

Our third Chilean wine, a 2022 Sauvignon Blanc came from Viña Morandé. The grapes for this wine come from Morande's estate located in Casablanca, a few miles from the Pacific Ocean. yCasablanca is one of the most internationally recognized wine regions for the quality of its wines.

Onto Uruguay where we enjoyed a 2020 Petit Verdot and a 2020 Tannat both from the Gimenez Mendez Winery. In 1991, Luis Alberto Gimenez and his wife Marta Mendez, with a long tradition in the wine business, decided to start producing premium wines for the domestic and international market. Focused since the beginning in taming the national Uruguayan grape - Tannat - GIMENEZ MENDEZ is now one of the leading exporter wineries of the country.

On July 17 we will venture to the wilds of Ammisville (just outside Warrenton) where we will visit Magnolia Vineyards. 

We are also currently forming an Auxiliary so that family members and young children can learn the ethos of service and build their resumes.


